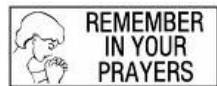

SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: We live in a country that prizes freedom, clings to the right to choose, and defines itself as “the land of the free and home of the brave.” God’s word today reminds us that with freedom comes responsibility. Liberty is not to be confused with license to do whatever I want. Jesus came to free us from the power of sin, selfishness and death. This liberation is deepened when we have entered into and frequently renew our covenant with God, the one ratified by the saving death of God’s Son on the cross. Jesus did not come to abolish the law or the prophets, but to fulfill them. In a warring world that justifies preventative strikes and collateral damage, Jesus forbids not only killing but even anger that bears a grudge and will not forgive. He teaches that reconciliation takes precedence even over worship, that adultery begins within the human heart by reducing another to an object for self-gratification, and that his followers are to speak with simplicity and integrity. Sound impossible? As an angel once told a questioning young woman, “Nothing will be impossible for God” (Luke 1:37). **How do you use your freedom?**

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY: Saint Vincent de Paul Society was founded by Blessed Frederic Ozanam and our patron Saint Vincent de Paul in 1833. It is an organization of volunteer lay people.

The society here at Holy Cross has been in existence for eleven years. Our purpose is to respond to the poor and needy in our community. We answer calls with requests for assistance with utility bills, rent, food and clothing. We are also concerned with the deeper needs and spiritual well being of those we help.

WORD OF LIFE: “Human life must always be defended from its beginning in the womb and must be recognized as a gift of God that guarantees the future of humanity.” ~Pope Francis, Letter to Brazilian families for National Week, August 6, 2013 “*La vida humana debe ser siempre defendida desde su inicio en el vientre materno y debe ser reconocida como un don de Dios que garantiza el future de la humanidad*”. ~Papa Francisco, Carta a las familias brasileñas por la Semana Nacional de la Familia, 6 de agosto de 2013.

RCIA “**Non-violence and Living Holy Lives**” is our teaching in RCIA this Wednesday. We’re called to pattern our lives upon the life of God. “*God is love, and he who abides in love, abides in God.*” God could and would never be unjust and unloving, so we can have confidence that our lives will be good and holy lives as we follow *the Master*.

Leviticus 19 teaches us to do more than avoid hating each other—we are urged to not nurse hatred. We might be called upon to correct one another at times, but our concern over another’s mistakes should not lead us into the sin of unkindness or self-righteousness. Every human being wants to be treated with kindness as we want to be treated.

The Golden Rule teaches us “*Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.*” It does not teach, “Do unto others as they did unto you.” Getting even with people is not the Christian way of living. All holiness flows from God, and brings with it mercy and kindness. We learn God’s holiness by following his laws.

Jesus, through the Holy Trinity, wants to live inside us so that we can begin to see with his eyes, hear with his ears, touch with his hands and think like he does. He will never force himself on us. True love never forces.

Jesus teaches us how to stand up for ourselves and others without resorting to evil actions ourselves. He uses three examples that teach us how to do this when someone more powerful is treating a weaker person badly:

...turn the other cheek—he’s not teaching us to ask to be hit again—he’s reminding us that we are asking to be treated as an equal. No matter what someone does, they can’t take away our dignity.

...give your cloak as well—people had to give some kind of collateral to get a loan. A . . . very poor person might have to give his tunic as collateral. Giving their cloak as well would show how the justice of the wealthy left the poor completely naked.

...go two miles—legally, soldiers could make people help carry heavy loads but only for one mile. If the soldier made someone go two miles they could get in trouble. So, by offering to go the 2nd mile, the person would put the soldier in the awkward position of having to ask for his load back to avoid legal trouble.

We are all called to live holy lives and Jesus is our model par excellence. He strengthens us on our journey to be his face on earth.

We invite adults who want to grow in their faith to come to RCIA. We also have a class for children on the same evening.

February 21st—**St. Peter Damian**, *bishop, religious & doctor of the church (1007-1072)* “That which does not kill me makes me strong.” The life of Peter Damian proves the truth of this old saying. Peter was a survivor. Born into an already large family in Ravenna, Italy, Peter was seen by his family as just an extra mouth to feed. When his parents died, Peter found himself in the household of an older brother, who underfed him and treated him as a slave. Like the prodigal son in the Gospel of Luke, Peter was forced to tend pigs. Finally another brother provided him with the money to go away to school. Despite his lack of early training, Peter was a fine student. By the time he was 25 years old he had become a famous professor. He taught at the universities at Parma and Ravenna. Perhaps because he knew what it was like to go hungry, Peter invited poor people to dine with him almost every evening. He served the meal himself. Peter wanted to pray and study scripture, so he became a monk. Soon he was appointed head of his community, and he remained in that position for 30years. Eventually Peter was named bishop of Ostia and a cardinal of the church. He fought hard against abuses of power by the clergy, such as paying bribes to obtain important jobs in the church. He encouraged monks to live a simple life of prayer. He was asked many times by popes to assist other monasteries, especially when they had arguments or scandals. Sever popes considered Peter their trusted advisor. On the way home from one of his papas missions, Peter caught a fever and became very ill. He died a peaceful death while the monks around him sang Morning Prayer.

 February 22nd—Feast of **The Chair of Peter, apostle**: In pagan times in Rome today was “Ancestors’ Day.” The Christians of Rome began to celebrate this day in memory of St. Peter, their “founding father,” their first bishop. Peter had come to Rome because Rome was the center of the empire and a center of the new Christian faith. Why is today’s feast call the *Chair* of St. Peter? Every bishop has a chair from which he presides and preaches. In Rome, in the basilica of St. Peter, an ancient wooden chair is preserved because it is thought to have been St. Peter’s. The Latin word for a bishop’s chair is *cathedra*. From this word comes our word “cathedral,” which is the home church of the bishop in each diocese. Today’s feast of the Chair of Peter honors the unity of the church. Peter’s chair has served as a symbol of his role as pastor of the whole church. This role has given popes great influence to speak for human needs and to condemn injustice.
