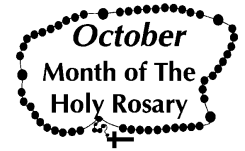

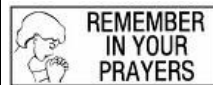

**TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME:** We can see in the prophet Isaiah’s poetic vision God’s plan for us when we enter the kingdom of heaven to live in joy and peace for all eternity. A meal of “juicy, rich food and pure, choice wines” will be set before us. The image of our God moving among us, wiping away our tears so that we can look clearly on the face of God, is both comforting and healing. However, the parable Jesus tells can be upsetting if we think of God the Father as the king who becomes enraged, not only at those who reject his invitation, but even at the poor man dragged in from the street without a wedding garment. What explains his being tossed out into the darkness? Jesus is addressing the religious leaders with a double message. First, God’s invitation to the kingdom is to be taken seriously and an ongoing response is expected. Furthermore, simply showing up is not enough. God calls and clothes us for the banquet at our Baptism. Our lives are to be spent continually putting on Christ. Sunday Eucharist anticipates the heavenly celebration . **Have you accepted God’s invitation? How have you put on Christ this past week?**

“**God’s Call and Our Response**” is our teaching in RCIA this Wednesday. It is based on Jesus’ teaching on the payment of taxes to Caesar and the tribute which must be paid to God. The Herodians and the Pharisees had opposing views on this issue, but because both groups were trying to trick Jesus, he gives them an answer they were not expecting. He tells the people that if they use Caesar’s money, they should expect to pay for it. Jesus had to ask for a coin to be used because he didn’t even own a coin. He reminds them that the state has a valid role although that role is limited because God is the ultimate ruler.

Jesus teaches us not to be distracted from the things which matter in life. . . from those things which are considered the **heart** of the matter:

- Give back to God what belongs to him.*
- Give him your mind. . . your understanding. . . your knowledge. All these belong to God.*
- Give him the joy experienced in friends and the peace which comes with it, the calm experienced in solitude: all these belong to God.*
- Give him the work you have done, the recognition you have achieved, the honor you have received: all these belong to God.*
- Give him the moments of family living, the days of hoping and dreaming, The years of faithfulness and promise: all these belong to God.*(Gaynell/Cronin)

Sometimes we make a god out of possessions and the accumulation of wealth. This is a distraction and a **false god**. Sometimes we try to control people or dominate them in a negative way when we have power in our jobs or lives. This is a **false god**. Sometimes we try to amuse ourselves at every moment of our lives, seeking pleasure and comfort, both physically and materially. This is a distraction and a **false god**. When we are oblivious to the needs of those around us, near and far, and instead make for ourselves a security which lulls us to sleep, we are distracted and have created a **false god**.

We are called to give honor and praise and glory to God. We learn this through our faithful practice of the gift of faith and through our baptism. We learn this through reading and studying God’s word in scripture. We learn this through living the Mass each Sunday and Holy Day. We learn this through living our vocation—marriage, single life, ordained ministry and religious life. We continue to learn and grow in our faith through service to others so that we can *give to Caesar what is Caesar’s and to God what belongs to God*.

Today we celebrate the Rite of Acceptance into the **Catechumenate** for those seeking Baptism and **Candidacy** for those adults preparing for Confirmation and First Communion. Please pray for all in the RCIA journey of faith and come to accompany them each Wednesday from 7-9 pm in the Religious Education Center. We meet with children ages 3-13 whose parents wish them to receive Baptism.

Feast of **St. Luke** *evangelist (first century)* — The gospel that bears Luke’s name was written sometime after the year 80. In the beginning of the gospel, the author says that he had spoken with eyewitnesses to the event. He also had Mark’s gospel, written earlier, as one of his sources. The author’s other work, the Acts of the Apostles, continues the events told in the gospel. It records the story of the church as it unfolded after the descent of the Holy Spirit. The Gospel of Luke displays Jesus’ sensitivity to the concerns of women and all others who are oppressed in society. The importance of prayer is stressed: Jesus spends time in prayer before making any important decision. The gospel notes many examples of the times Jesus healed the sick in mind and body. And both the gospel and the Acts of the Apostles make it clear that Jesus came to save everyone—Samaritans, lepers, tax collectors, Roman soldiers, public sinners, even shepherds. The Gospel of Luke is symbolized by an ox, like the oxen that were sacrificed at the Temple. The gospel begins with the story of John the Baptist’s father offering sacrifice in the Temple. But just who was St. Luke? We know about him from Paul and other early Christian writers. Luke never knew Jesus personally. He was a well-educated Greek. He may have been a doctor. Paul was his catechist, and in return he became Paul’s loyal friend and assistant. He joined Paul at Troas during his second missionary journey and stayed with him through his travels, except during the times when Luke was assigned to stay with a community. When Paul was imprisoned, Luke stayed close by to assist him and watch over his health. Paul described him as “the beloved physician. Perhaps this tradition began because the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles are so descriptive.
